



Australian Cheesecake

1 ½ cup Graham Cracker Crumbs 6 Tbls. Butter; Melted ¼ cup Granulated Sugar

Cheesecake filling 1 lb. Cream Cheese ½ cup Sugar 3 Eggs; Large, Separated ¼ Cup Unbleached Flour 1 tsp. Lemon Rind, Grated 2 tsp. Lemon Juice 1 tsp. Vanilla Extract ½ cup Heavy Cream/Sweet cream 2 Tbls. Passion Fruit (pulp from fresh passion fruit)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Place the crumbs in a mixing bowl and add the butter and sugar blending well. Press the crumb mixture into the bottom and up the sides of an 8-inch springform pan. Smooth the mixture to form an even layer on the bottom and sides. Bake the crust in the oven for 10 minutes and let cool to room temperature before filling.

<u>Cheesecake:</u> Preheat the oven to 300 degrees F. In a large mixing bowl, beat the cream cheese and sugar until light and fluffy. Add the egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Beat in the flour, lemon rind, lemon juice, and vanilla until just mixed. Whip the cream until stiff in a medium mixing bowl. Set aside. In another mixing bowl, beat the egg whites until they form stiff peaks, then fold them into the cheese mixture. Fold in the reserved whipped cream. Stir in the passion fruit pulp then pour the mixture into the prepared crust and bake for 45 minutes to 1 hour. Cool to room temperature, then chill.

Epangishimog Pakwejigan (Shuswap Bannock) - Native American Bread

3 Cups All-purposes flour 1 Tbls. Baking powder 1 ½ tsp. Salt 1 ½ cups Water 1 cup Blueberries

Mix the dry ingredients together, the add the water quickly & continue to stir. Gently stir in blueberries. Spread batter on a pie plate & put in a preheated oven heated to 425F. Bake for 20 minutes. Cut in pieces & serve hot or cold. Excellent with mint tea.

Ma'oa And Pahua Tairo-Tahiti

2 Dozen ma'oa [turbot snails] or pahua [clams] 500 g Taioro [juice of grated coconuts, seawater and shrimps] 3 Onions 2 Garlic cloves Salt and pepper

The snail of the ma'oa may be extracted from the shell either by breaking the shells with a hammer or by boiling them for a few minutes if you wish to keep the shells intact. Wash the snails Preheat oven to 250 degrees F. With an and remove the pocket of black matter. In the case of the pahua, a bivalve, the muscle adhering to the shell should be the sugar. Beat until firm. Add the severed, the meat extracted from the cornstarch, vinegar and vanilla. When shell, and the black matter removed. Soak in fresh water for a few hours. Mix with the taioro, then add the chopped onions and garlic plus seasoning. Serve at room temperature.

WARNING—Note that there's no mention of actually cooking!

Native American Fried Green Tomatoes

2 lb Green tomatoes 4 ea Eggs 1 1/4 cup Corn meal 3/4 cup Water 1/4 cup Minced chives 1 tb Salt 1/4 tsp. Pepper, fresh ground 1/4 cup Butter or margarine

Slice the tomatoes 1/2 inch thick, but 1 ½ lb New potatoes do not peel or core. Drain well between several thicknesses of paper toweling until most of the moisture of the tomatoes is absorbed. While the tomatoes are draining, make a batter by beating the eggs until light, then mixing in the corn meal, water, minced chives, salt and pepper. In a large, heavy iron skillet, heat the butter or margarine until bubbly. Dip the tomato slices into batter, and brown quickly on both sides. Serve immediately.

Navajo Fry Bread

1 Cup white flour ½ Cup whole wheat flour 1 Tbls. sugar ½ tsp. baking powder ¼ tsp. salt ½ cup honey vegetable oil

Mix dry ingredients. Add water to dry ingredients, mix well. Knead dough on a floured board until it becomes elastic. Cover and let dough rest 10 minutes.

Roll out dough to 1/2 inch thick. Cut into squares or circles. Deep-fry at 370F till golden brown; drain on paper towels. Drizzle with honey and serve.

Pavlova II - Australian Meringue Dessert

4 large Egg whites

1 Cup Granulated Sugar, (castor sugar)

1 Tbls. Cornstarch

1 tsp. Vinegar

1 tsp. Vanilla flavour

electric mixer beat the egg whites until soft peaks form, then gradually add combined, turn out onto a flat tray that has been greased and dusted with cornstarch. Try a circular shape with slightly more mixture at the edges so that it may be served by placing goodies in the center depression.

Cook in a pre-heated, cool (250 degrees F.) oven for one hour. When cooked, turn the oven off, leave the oven door slightly ajar, and allow to cool slowly in the oven. This slow cooling works to prevent the loss of too much height. Serve cold, with whipped cream and fresh fruit pieces, strawberries and kiwi fruit for example.

Yataklete Kilkil - African Spiced **Vegetables**

1 each Broccoli head, stem included 5 large Carrots, sliced in small rounds 1 small Cauliflower, coarsely chopped 1 med. Onion, coarsely chopped ½ cup Ghee

If potatoes are very small, leave them whole: if not quarter them. Remove tough outer fiber of the broccoli stalk. Chop entire broccoli. Steam potatoes, broccoli stem, carrots & cauliflower over boiling water. After 10 minutes, add the broccoli florets & steam for a few more minutes. Vegetables should be just tender. Meanwhile, in a heavy skillet, saute the onions in half the ghee until they are transparent. Mix in the steamed vegetables except the broccoli florets. Cover & cook for 6 to 8 minutes, stirring frequently. Add broccoli & cook another 5 minutes. Heat remaining ghee & pass around at the table. Serve with injera (flatbread)
